NORLUP HOMESTEAD



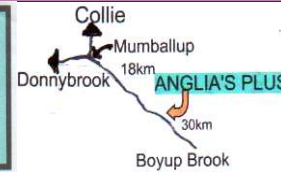
'Commander' Scott had the first convict-built brick home in the district, using the skills of one J. Smith (brick maker & layer), assigned to him. Evidence of the construction process can still be seen along with other historical matters of interest. 'J' (John? or Jack?) Smith also built Jayes Homestead (not open to the public) and later Scotts Hotel (now Tavern) in Bridgetown.

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The Gregory Tree

The initial exploration of the Boyup Brook area (then known as the 'Upper Blackwood') was marked by a surveyor's bench-mark cut on this tree by Assistant Surveyor A. C. Gregory (1819-1905), during his first journey through the Blackwood District. The remains of the tree can be seen on Gibbs Road. Information sheet at the Visitor Centre.

At the locality of Dinninup is found the Upper Blackwood Show Society grounds. Here you can see the **oldest standing building in the Shire** called 'The Brick Hall', built in 1905 (brick/iron) and the smaller of two buildings, as well as the 1930 timber hall known as 'the Large Hall'. The **Mural**, below, created on the corner building depicts Agricultural Shows through time. Driving into the **township** will reveal the **old store and other buildings of interest**.
